



A log cabin in the trees

In 2002, Jane and her husband Jaxon, who died in 2006, built a fantasy structure on their property that married their two different but compatible ideas of an outdoor room. His concept was a log cabin. Jane wanted a tree-house. The log cabin in the trees was created as a close-to-home getaway for the couple, whose adult daughter Claudine owns a house down the road. The structure was built into the edge of a stand of Norway Spruce trees that Jane has since carefully trimmed to create an oasis of shade. It originally served as a place the couple enjoyed for cocktail hour. Now, it is a breakfast room for Jane's bed and breakfast tent campsite, Blue Hills Farm.

The treehouse has a sturdy staircase that leads to a treetop room with windows and a solid wood floor. Everything at Blue Hills is solid. This is not the tree-house of your childhood. It boasts antique furnishings and is completely secure from the elements. Down on the ground, there is a seating area and an antique stove that Jane rescued from a chicken coop on her property and had converted to use with propane. It's where she now prepares omelets to order for her overnight guests. She recently served dinner for 12 in the pine grove for a group of friends.

Guests of Blue Hills Farm are treated to a four-course breakfast according to their own schedule. A cold raspberry soup is accompanied by an assortment of fresh-baked goods, including Jane's special rhubarb walnut crumb muffins, and an egg-based casserole with sausage, onion and cheese, according to her guest's preference. An orange juice and lemon-lime spritzer freshens the palate, and china service sets the glamorous tone of the meal. An old working Victrola is one of many antiques Jane selected for her airy breakfast room from local stores like Bridgewater Mercantile in Jeffersonville, NY and Domesticities in Youngsville, NY.

Luxuries of home

The tree-house breakfast room is part two of a stay at Blue Hills Farm. Overnight quarters are a short walk away in the 16-by-20-foot tent/house. The tent is a custom-made canvas structure that is hitched to a solid reclaimed oak platform. It is fully screened, and a bathroom befitting a luxury home is attached to the tent by a sliding barn door. The tiled bathroom boasts a two-person spa-jetted shower with a pebbled tile floor and custom-designed electric wall sconces. An electric heater in the style of a woodstove keeps toes cozy in the mountain air. Antique wood planes, repurposed as towel hooks, are among the many inventive designs in the interior.


A trip to Blue Hills Farm—Blue Hills was a name given to the Catskills by early settlers—starts with an ATV ride from Jane's red and white cottage on Route 52 through a leafy forest path. The sturdy tan canvas tent sits in a clearing among old oak and maple trees. Graceful hand-wrought twig chairs grace the porch above a welcoming flagstone. The tent is furnished with comfortably upholstered furniture, including a loveseat and chair and a carved-oak queen-sized bed with a Tempurpedic mattress. Crisp linens are topped with a bedspread custom-made by the proprietress, who is at home with a needle and thread, among her many other talents. When you call for reservations, Jane asks for your shoe size along with your dietary requirements, so she can whip up a pair of custom-felted slippers for your stay.

This is Blue Hills' inaugural season and although it was built to cater to couples, the first guests were a father and son celebrating the son's college graduation with a guided fishing trip on the Delaware River with local fishing guide Tony Ritter. When the two men arrived at the campsite, the son said, "Dad, we made the right choice." It would be hard to make a bad choice at Blue Hills Farm. Nearby attractions include Bethel Woods Center for the Arts (site of the original 1969 Woodstock Festival), Fort Delaware, the Upper Delaware Recreation Area, the Delaware Valley Arts Alliance in Narrowsburg and many fine fishing and swimming areas as well as antiques and art galleries.

Rates are \$200 per couple per night, plus tax, and include a full breakfast (and slippers!) Blue Hills accepts reservations from June 1 through November 1. For more information call Jane Luchsinger at 845/252-3864.

























of artifacts (pictured on page 11) that have a predominately Asian influence. Warm tones in orange, brown and gold help unify the stark modern space, and modern fixtures, like the two-blade ceiling fan, help keep it interesting and current.

Start with natural elements

The foundation of global style is a natural backdrop achieved with paint, wall coverings and fabrics. Textural and rustic treatments on walls and natural fabrics in vivid and warm tones help unify the eclectic mix of furnishings and collectables. The couple used grasscoth wallpaper to accent their built-in bookcase (pictured below).

instead. They re-stained the knotty pine a darker, ebony tone, and wallpapered the back wall with a

natural grasscloth. The Asian style and soft palette blends well with their collection of global treasures.

Shohola Magic

Artistic vision creates a special home


A paved road leads to a dirt road that leads to the Shohola, PA refuge of David and Joann Wells Greenbaum, but the drive is worth it. Rounding a curve in their driveway, the woods open to a clearing, and the sun shines on a magical bluestone labyrinth, stones piled to make pillars that mark its entryway. It's a fitting introduction to a home that radiates warmth, charm and the gracious artistic

sensibilities of its inhabitants.

A variety of David's ceramic pots hang from the trees and posts scattered around the property. Bluestone unearthed during construction was broken into sheets to make walkways around the house. Vegetables thrive in pots on a south-facing deck that overlooks a ceremonial fire pit. Birds flit through the trees, and a rabbit hops through the grass.



Always intrigued by labyrinths, the Greenbaums used rocks from their property to create this magical space.

Deliberate design

David and Joann have built five houses in their 33 years of marriage (although they have lived in more), and this one is "the synthesis of what we learned were our needs and desires," says Joann. Joann, who grew up in Baltimore, and David, who was raised in New Jersey, moved to the area in 2004 from Florida, where they had lived for many years. They came here to be closer to family.

David is a long-time student of architectural design. Of their Shohola home, he says, "There is very little that we would change if we were to do it over." Joann adds, "When we were young and starting out, we wanted to see how we could handle a back-to-nature situation. We lived in one room with our two sons. We didn't have electricity. We had an outhouse. It was simple, but not so comfortable. With this house, we wanted to keep it simple and efficient, but have more comforts."

Their oldest son Ethan is now a contemporary gallery artist who has shown his work in Los Angelos, New York City and Chicago. Granger, their younger son, is an entrepreneur who owns a moving company. Both now live in

David and Joann designed the 1100-square-foot house and, says David, "we were serious participants in its construction." One of their goals, energy efficiency, was achieved by placing the largest bank of windows on the south side for passive solar gain, installing energy efficient windows, using R57 insulated concrete forms in the walls and installing a radiant heating system in the floors. The house is heated primarily with wood cut from their property.



Living space

A screened-in front porch has mahogany floors and a convenient box for firewood. The box can be loaded from outside and unloaded within reach of the front door.

From the porch, visitors step into the open and airy first story, which is one large living area with maple floors uniting three living areas—a sitting area with chairs nestled around the wood stove, an eating area and a kitchen with cherry wood cabinets and a six-burner stove. Joann loves to cook and does sprouting.

A Craftsman-style banister leads upstairs to the master bedroom and a guest room, both built in the space that in a conventional home would be the attic. The 18/12 roof pitch has two benefits: not only are the rooms charming with their sloped ceilings, but the sun heats the rooms rather than heating un-lived-in space. David noted that the steep slope of the roof also sheds snow efficiently.

The screened-in porch off the master bedroom gives "the feeling of an old-fashioned sleeping porch," in the summer when the French doors are open, says Joann. She "loves to lie in bed and look up and see the stars and the moon" through the skylights. The couple, avid canoeists and kayakers, live within walking distance to Twin Lakes. David designed and built a boat trailer that attaches to his bicycle, and when they are not in their studios making art, they spend many hours on the glacial lake.



Studio time

Both artists keep a regular working schedule in their home studios. Joann (joannwellsgreenbaum.com, http:// www.etsy.com/shop/joann100) paints and makes jewelry. Working in gouache and ink, she paints whimsical, vibrantly colored paintings that "tell a story." She also does commissioned architectural portraits, some of which can be seen at Bluestone Gallery (see information, below). Jewelry is a "focal point" and she has created a line of earrings and pendants as whimsical as their name, Shnookumzelia.

In his pottery studio in the basement of the house, David (greenbaumpottery.com, shoholabells.com) crafts large ceramic bells. They hang from cedar and welded steel bases which he makes in his wood shop that occupies the barn behind the house. He calls the bells "a wonderful progression in my clay life. They are just thrilling. They have a humble universal nature that's very appealing."

Joann also runs the business dimension of their various enterprises, and David spends weekends at the Bluestone Gallery (104 East Ann Street, Milford, PA, 570/296-9999, www.bluestonegallerymilford.com) where he is the operations manager, working closely with owner Bob Levine. The gallery is open Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 11am to 6 pm or by appointment.

Honesdale's thriving art scene

Three new galleries have come to the town of Honesdale, PA in the last several years, and with it a brand new image for the town. The galleries share a spirit of cooperation and they all have benefited from the programs of the Wayne County Arts Alliance (WCAA), which is hosting an open studio tour at the end of July.







Willow River Gallery (118 Willow Avenue, Honesdale, PA 18431, 570/253-3013, willowrivergallery.com), owned and operated by the husband-and-wife team of photographer Phil Garfield and artist Trix Render, celebrated its first-year anniversary on July 4. Reflecting on how the last year has gone, Render says, "The first year was really good—we expected much less. Now people are returning to their summer homes; its great there is a buzz around our anniversary."

Willow River changes shows about every month. "I have a good staple of artists," says Render. "I look for something I like, with an eye for quality and collectible artists, as well as something that will appeal to the public. Or, I might see potential in a young artist." Recently showing at Willow River was a retrospective of work by Margo Spoerri, who has a studio on Main Street in Narrowsburg, NY.

Render is participating, along with photographer Chip Forelli and artist Joe Kluck, in the 8th annual Wayne County Arts Alliance (WCAA) Open Studio Tour. Visitors will be able to see her at work in her studio located in the gallery, along with Forelli and Kluck. Last year, says Render, the studio tour drew 100

Willow River has seven elegantly styled rooms on two different floors, and often hosts more than one exhibit at a time. Render and her husband plan to open it to the community on a more regular basis in the future, with food tastings, benefits, readings and

Hanson Gallery (1037 Main Street, Honesdale, PA 18431, 570/253-2525, www.thehansongallery.com) opened in June 2009 and is a housed in a recently restored building which, owners Lars and Cynthia Hanson say, brings back the historic flavor of the past while moving forward with a modern setting for the arts. Not only does it have The Gallery, which features fine artists and artisans of the Northeast Pennsylvania region, it houses The Decorium with antique, vintage and new furniture, framed prints and collectibles, and a well-equipped art supply store. The establishment has been nominated for a historic preservation award by the Wayne County Historical Society.

'We have been very well received," says Lars. "Artists are happy we're here, as are the townsfolk and weekenders. It is exciting what is happening in Honesdale in general."

The gallery had its first solo show in May. In July it is showcasing all of the artists who are participating in the WCAA open studio tour, where visitors can get a sense of the artists' work and style, and collect a map for use during the tour. In August, the gallery will continue its move toward thematic shows with a group show on surrealism and fantasy.

The Hanson Gallery, along with the Willow River and Philip Hone galleries and the WCAA, see their role as enhancing the arts scene through cooperation with each other. "We want to promote Honesdale as an arts destination," said Cynthia, "In the future, we hope to coordinating openings, maybe create arts walk

The Philip Hone Gallery (742 Main Street, Honesdale, PA 18431, 570/253-5577, www.philiphonegallery.com) opened in 2008. Current owner and gallery director Caroline Denary volunteered there for eight months before she purchased the gallery. This mother of four was raised in Wayne County and sees her gallery as a community arts space where classes, poetry readings, jazz sessions, drumming circles and "artists' lounges" are as common as the art

Philip Hone Gallery is a cooperative-style gallery with 30 participating members who share costs to keep the gallery open. In addition to the 18 painters, the gallery shows the work of jewelers, folk artists, glass blowers and other artisans. The space also has a rotating show that features the artists in Connections Magazine. Denaro herself is a portrait artist.

Her gallery shares space in the same building as the WCAA, and Denaro is a business member. Not all of her artists are from Wayne County, she says, and so the gallery in not directly participating in the open studio tour. She does collaborate with the other galleries from time to time; for example, every month she gives away a gift certificate for the Hanson Gallery art supply store.

How has the past year gone? "We have a wonderful following of people who attend classes and events, and come to the gallery. I enjoy doing things, working with the children. I am very down to earth, easy going. Here there is always a pot of tea and some cake, some coffee." She serves snacks and soups at her events, which are free of charge, although donations are welcomed. "We are hoping to promote the whole community," says Denaro. "It's been really wonderful so far."

Travel on 17B through Bethel, and you will see a sign for Korean Arts Village (2572 Route 17B, Bethel, NY 12720, 845/583-1010.) Of all the people who see the sign and keep driving, restaurant owner Loren Kim says, "One day they actually decide to stop, and then they become our regular customers."

There is no better time than now to take the road down to a culinary adven-

The family-run Korean Arts Village opened in 2006 and is now in its fourth season. Kim's uncle, Mr. Ahn, came to the United States to become the chef after 20 years of running a restaurant in Korea. Thus, the cuisine at Korean Arts is very authentic to Korean cooking. "Korean food is not as popular or globalized yet as, say, Chinese food," says Kim. "We are familiar, but somehow very different as well." In order to help her customers appreciate what they are eating, Kim takes time to explain what the food is, its cultural meaning, how it is prepared and how to eat it.

The restaurant serves vegetarian fare as well as beef, chicken and pork. "A very popular dish is called bibimbap, " says Kim. "It is rice ball with all varieties of cooked vegetables on the top. It's a great meal to explain different vegetables, and it is very nutritious. It comes

with a sweet pepper paste on the side." Other favorites are Galbi barbeque, which is beef shortribs mariniated in a sauce made from fruit juice and rice wine, soy sauce and garlic. A Korean delicacy, popular with Kim's Korean customers as well as others, is a roast duck prepared the traditional Korean way, stuffed with healthy grains and rice and cooked for several hours in earthenware pressure cooker. This special dish, which is enough to feed three or four people, must be ordered two hours in advance by calling the restaurant.

Korean Arts Village also prepares local rainbow trout and eel dishes, along with other fish dishes. It has a select offering of Korean plum wines, rice wines and sakes. There is outdoor seating with a view overlooking the lake on the grounds, which, Kim says, is also available for fishing after dinner.

In the future, says Kim, she hopes to develop the site to become a small Korean museum and village, with displays that will entertain guests and educate them about Korean history, games and culture.

Sonoma Falls Cider Mill and Country Market (140 Old Liberty Road, Livingston Manor, NY, 12758, 845/439-4949/store or 607-498-6008/office) sits on an incredible piece of real estate: 127 acres of woods in the Catskill foothills with a seven-tiered waterfall running through it. It's a roadside attraction, but one that you can't see from the road. The waterfalls alone make a visit worthwhile, but once you arrive there is so much more to see and do. You can spend a day or a week at this year-round attraction.

A spot for all seasons

In the summer, catch trout in a stocked pond—poles and permits provided, and priced by the pound. In the fall, watch the cider mill pressing fresh juice or take a hayride to a twoacre pumpkin patch. In the winter, hop on a toboggan or put on some ice skates, pick out your holiday tree, or watch the sugar house in full steam. In the spring, hike to the top of the falls along wildflower-lined trails—or, better yet, take a horseback ride. "Sonoma Falls is a year-round resort where people can come spend the day inexpensively and really enjoy what the mountains have to offer," says co-owner Elvin "Woody" Wood.

Throughout the year, the market stocks produce, preserves, meats and sweets. They recommend you give a call to see what's on the agenda the day of your visit.

Entrepreneurial spirit

Two real estate developers opened Sonoma Falls last fall. Manhattanite Jerry Turco, who develops properties throughout the United States, comes to Roscoe on the weekends and

is also the proprietor of a restaurant there, Live Bait (1987 Old Route 17). Sullivan County native Wood is a businessman turned politician, currently in the position of county legislator representing District 3 around Livingston Manor. Turco and Wood formed Twin Rivers Land Development to develop log cabin homes in the area. When they purchased the Sonoma Falls attraction, they had the resources to get the job done with their own staff. They hired can-do manager Paul Haan this year, a fifth-generation farmer from Callicoon Center.

Applicious

After several months of tearing down and repairing buildings, Turco, Wood and their soon-to-be-manager Hahn went to pick up the cider mill over Labor Day weekend. Wood knew Wayside Farms mill from his trips through Wolcott, NY, to Lake Ontario. When he couldn't get cider there, he had the idea to buy the mill. The hardscrabble Catskills foothills are not ideal apple conditions, but orchards in New Paltz (spring) and the Syracuse area (fall) deliver a variety of sweet apples by the crate. Sonoma Falls cider never tastes the same twice, and that is by design.

The cider mill operation is designed to be completely visible to the public. Apples roll into the barn from an outdoor holding bin onto a conveyor belt, where a few hands sort the bad from the bunch before they reach the wash stage. The clean apples enter the grinder to become pumice. The pumice is then pressed. When the batch is complete, the juice runs from a holding tank through the UV processor and into a refrigerated 440gallon tank where it is gravity-fed straight to the store cider fountain and served fresh or bottled. It takes about 36 apples to produce one gallon of apple cider.

Essential sweetness

The shop serves small meals and caters to those interested in taking home souvenirs and gifts. Fudge, ice cream, confections, jams, maple syrup, honey and, in the cooler, the bestsellers: sweet cider and pork and beef from Hahn's farm. The shop is applying for a Pride of New York certification, a seal that would help to drive home the local provenance of its dry goods, assorted sundries, cider and maple syrup.

The maple sugaring season generally begins in late winter, depending on weather and sap flow. The sap is tapped onsite and carried either by bucket or fed by plastic tube. The crew bases the thermostat off of

a hydrometer reading and then gets down to steamy business of sugaring. The stove is stainless steel, woodfired, with cord wood stacked neatly around it. It lives inside a cozy new building adjacent to the store. The sap comes into the stove and separates into drop flues that maximize surface area and increase boiling times. After that, the digital draw-off knows when the syrup is cooked (usually around temperatures of 216 to 219 degrees Farenheit), and automatically opens the valve to the finished product. Then the syrup is filtered and bottled. As the season progresses, the syrup changes grades, starting light and going darker. Forty gallons of sap becomes about one gallon of syrup.

Getting better all the time

Sonoma Falls continues to improve every week. Turco, Wood and Hahn are trail building, fencing and adding finishing touches to what they built last year. They are putting some cookouts on the calendar, and are catering to events. Most importantly, they are finishing the campsites that will make the attraction a one-stop family-fun destination. "This place is about having fun, that's basically it," says Turco. "Every week it's better."

Sonoma Falls is open year-round, seven days a week. Call ahead for activities and menu options. The website is under construction at www.sonomafallsny.com.
